The Power of a Good Sandwich



Royer-Greaves Students and Adults Acquire Vocational Skills While Helping Others

Every week, a group of Royer-Greaves students or adults goes shopping, makes sandwiches, and delivers lunch to people who are experiencing housing and food insecurity.

The Royer-Greaves sandwich-makers have a visual impairment along with other disabilities. With staff support, the sandwich teams plan the meals, shop for ingredients, then form an assembly line to layer bread, meat, and cheese. They wrap the sandwiches and make sure every brown bag gets one, along with a bottle of water, a piece of fruit, and a small sweet. They then help deliver the bounty to Good Samaritan Services in Phoenixville.

"Through making and delivering sandwiches, participants learn a vocational skill set and skills of daily living, including planning, how to comparison shop, assembling skills, team work and organization," said Jim Powers, Royer-Greaves strategic planning consultant and one of the staff members who coordinates the program. "They also experience the joy of giving."

Sandwich team member John M. embraces all of it. "I like putting on my food service uniform, making sandwiches with my friends, and then delivering the lunches," he said. "I really feel good about helping other people."

Behind the scenes support

The sandwich-making program is primarily funded by the Drishti Foundation, with additional support from area ACME Markets.

Drishti was founded by high school and middle school children with a mission to support visually impaired people in their pursuit of education, health care, and job readiness, said Treasurer and Co-Founder Phani Raparla. "When we were made aware of this program, which helps students and adults develop work

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skills it seemed like a fantastic way we could contribute," he said. Drishti has also donated hand-held radios and the funds raised in the most recent Drishti Dash walk and run to Royer-Greaves and Drishti volunteers regularly help around campus. Good Samaritan provides emergency, transitional, and affordable housing, along with support services, to people in Chester and Lancaster counties. Those enjoying the Royer-Greaves sandwich lunches are often taking a break from completing job applications or working toward their driver's license, said Julie Morrow, who coordinates donations in Chester County, and Mandy Ramos, director of community engagement. The recipients appreciate the food, but it's much more than that, they said.

"A simple lunch that was put together for you says 'you're valued, you're worth something, you're loved," Ramos said. "One sandwich communicates a lot," Morrow added. "You never know how that's going to change someone's life."



Jim credits his father, who was president of Horn and Hardart Baking Co., with instilling in him a desire to serve others. One thanksgiving, his dad helped a man who appeared to have no home up from the sidewalk, sat him in the front of the restaurant dining room, and told the manager to give him anything he wanted. "That's where it all started," Jim said.
